# **Emergency Preparedness and Response**

#### Plan, Equip, Train, Exercise --- Know the Warning Signs --- Stay Informed

Emergencies can create a variety of hazards for workers in the impacted area. Preparing before an emergency incident plays a vital role in ensuring that employers and workers have the necessary equipment, know where to go, and know how to keep themselves safe when an emergency occurs.

### **Planning**

Develop an evacuation plan to guide everyone in the workplace when immediate action is necessary. Planning in advance helps ensure that everyone knows what to do when an emergency occurs. A thorough evacuation plan should include:

- Conditions that will activate the plan
- Chain of command
- Emergency functions and who will perform them
- Specific evacuation procedures, including routes and
- Procedures for accounting for personnel, customers and visitors
- Equipment for personnel
- Review the plan with workers

Some businesses are required to have an *Emergency Action* Plan meeting the requirements under 29 CFR 1910.38, Visit https://www.osha.gov/etools/evacuation-plans-procedures for more information.

#### **Train & Exercise**

- Ensure that all workers know what to do in case of an emergency.
- Practice evacuation plans on a regular basis.
- Update plans and procedures based on lessons learned from exercises.
- Ensure that all workers to develop the skills needed to perform their assigned task/operation.
- Ensure that all workers are trained about the general hazards, conditions, and work expected to be performed.
- Maintain records of worker training include training certificates, attendance rosters, and course curricula.



#### Response/Recovery

- Evaluate the work site to identify if safety or health haz- Hurricanes ards.
- As appropriate, conduct task-specific exposure monitoring during response and recovery activities.
- Mitigate hazards by eliminate or substitution, engineering controls, work practice or administration controls.
- Perform work practices provide for basic safety, sanitation, and good housekeeping.
- Ensure that all workers are trained about the sitespecific hazards, conditions, and work expected to be performed.

## **Know the Warning Systems**

Central Pacific Hurricane Season: June 1-November 30.

Hurricane/Tropical Storm watches: A hurricane or tropical storm is possible in the specified area.

Hurricane/Tropical Storm warnings: A hurricane or tropical storm is expected to reach the area, typically within 24 hours.

Flood Watch: Flooding is possible.

Flash Flood Watch: Flash flooding is possible. Be prepared to move to higher ground.

Flood Warning: Imminent threat - Flooding is occurring or will occur soon; if advised to evacuate, do so immediately.
