

Highlights in 2015


- The total number of injuries dropped by 880 or 11.7 percent from 7,550 in 2014 to 6,670 in 2015.
- Construction made up the largest decrease of injuries by 400 or 54.8 percent to 330 in 2015.
- Professional and Business Services was lower by 190 or 26.8 percent from 710 in 2014.
- Most of the injuries were Sprains, strains, tears (34.6%) but fell by 630 or 21.4 percent from 2,940 in 2014.
- From 2014 to 2015 heat (thermal) burns grew by 90 injuries or 69.2 percent.
- Ladder (-52.9%) and Machinery (-48.9%), each decreased by around one-half in source of injury in 2015.
- Falls, slips, trips fell from 1,790 to 1,310 in 2015, falling by 26.8 percent.
- Building and Grounds Cleaning and Maintenance occupations decline from 1,020 to 770 or 24.5 percent in 2015.
- Lower extremities also reported a decrease by 24.0 percent, from 1,710 in 2014.

Distribution of injuries and illnesses by source, private industry, Hawaii, 2015








Distribution of injuries and illnesses by event or exposure, private industry, Hawaii, 2015

Distribution injuries and illnesses by major occupational group, private industry, Hawaii, 2015







These data do not reflect the changes the Occupational Safety and Health Administration made to its recordkeeping requirements effective January 1, 2002: therefore estimates for these industries are not comparable to estimates in other industries.
