II. Approval of Minutes

A. September 7, 2023 Meeting Minutes

The approval of September 7, 2023 minutes was deferred to the next meeting.

III. Updates and Reports on Partner Program Activities from September 7, 2023 to October 5, 2023

A. Linguistics Pathway Subcommittee Report

Dina Yoshimi announced that the draft proposal has been completed and reviewed by two interpreters. They plan to share it with the workforce sector in Healthcare and the Department of Education's Workforce Innovation Group. It will cover the work that is required for someone working with a certified nursing assistant, people who work with phlebotomists and pharmaceutical technicians. It will provide skills to help people who work with bi-lingual patients or patients who have limited English proficiency. Their goal is to have the final proposal accepted by the workforce sector in Healthcare and the Department of Education's Workforce Innovation Group by October. If it's accepted, they plan to look for schools that are interested in offering it in Fall 2024.

B. Workforce Development Diploma and Union Updates

April Acquavella was not able to attend this meeting. Chair Cary Miyashiro noted that there are no updates regarding the Workforce Development diploma and whether it will be accepted as a minimum requirement.

Edgar Fernandez pointed out that if the program sponsor wants to use the Workforce Development diploma as a minimum requirement, they need to revise their standards. Cary Miyashiro reiterated that the unions are still in discussion. The September 7, 2023 meeting minutes will be revised to reflect that the unions are still in discussion and there have been no changes to the standards.

C. Sector Strategies and Career Pathways Committee Updates

Cary Miyashiro gave updates on the committee. At the September 5, 2023 meeting, Chair Cary Miyashiro announced that they received approval to expand the Waipahu High School's Special Education program to five schools. They are in discussion with school administrators and teachers regarding implementation of this transitional program at: Kapolei, Roosevelt, Leleihua, Maui and Kapa'a high schools. The target start date would be the 2024 – 2025 school year.

Chair Miyashiro noted that the board met last month to discuss the State's Strategic Plan. The November committee meeting is cancelled, as members from the National Governor's Association will be in Hawaii to assist in the State Plan the week of October 30, 2023 – November 3, 2023.

Chair Miyashiro will be contacting Sarah Guay to go over the Workforce Development Diploma and the Career Foundation Certificate.

Chair Miyashiro has been discussing possible internships at Hawaiian Airlines for individuals from the Special Education Program. Possible positions would be in stock and inventory management. The discussions are still in progress.

Chair Miyashiro also announced that he is working with Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum to expand the aviation sector. Chair Miyashiro is also in preliminary stages with the Hawaii Public Health Institute and other health academies with the goal of getting students interested in careers in dental and healthcare fields.

IV. Presentation on the Second Chance Program (Corrections)

Janet Davidson presented attached deck.

After the presentation, Janet Davidson emphasized that the importance of the program is to provide more resources. Mark Menard said that with the Quest grant they can help place exoffenders into internships with he hopes that they will get hired by employers. He and Janet Davidson plan to partner to help these individuals by giving them more opportunities when they are released.

Lea Dias asked why an associate degree in business administration was chosen. Janet Davidson confirmed that is what the Department of Public Safety requested. In the future they would like to offer a bachelor's degree that has more flexibility. They would also like to work with Windward Community College, who has a similar program. Lea Dias pointed out that her agency can assist with offenders who have disabilities and offer support when they are released.

Bennette Misalucha asked what type of options are given to inmates who are transferred to Arizona, since the classes are taught in person. Janet Davidson confirmed that once a student is admitted into the program they cannot be transferred. She noted that with the Mellon Award, they plan to update their technology and create a virtual option in the future.

Bennette Misalucha also asked what type of outreach has been done to spread the word, and if there have been any challenges in getting inmates to sign up for these classes. Janet Davidson admitted that it was challenging at first, but the upcoming class has 62 students. She pointed out that some are not eligible for the Pell Grant, so they are hoping to do more fundraising to cover scholarships.
