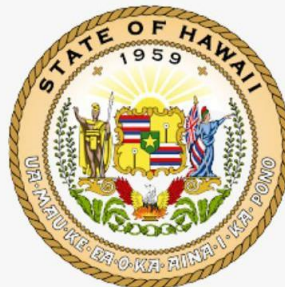
The purpose of this internship program is to provide exposure to a variety of jobs and occupations within the state government that may transition into gainful employment.

The American Job Center Goals for 2024

- Become a comprehensive American Job Center (AJCH)
- Provide Outreach to East and West Hawaii including special populations (Justice Involved, Veterans, Persons with Disabilities, Older Americans-Kupuna.)
- Begin process to introduce affiliate and remote AJC locations throughout Hawaii Island.
- Partner with non-profit & other State organizations serving foster youth and transitioning foster youth.
- Outreach to high school students island-wide encouraging access to the AJCH.
- Increase daily in person attendance in the AJC resource room

Current Needs

- Additional program training for partners, providers and funders.
- Statewide marketing strategy to promote the AJCH and its importance to the community.
- Increase services to veterans on a statewide level

Challenges

- Navigating the process to include the justice involved population to the career & employment pathways available at the AJCH.
- Meeting the federal regulation requiring mandated partners at the AJCH, since 2018 DLIR Workforce Development Division & Goodwill Industries are the only mandated partners present.
- Increasing veteran foot traffic
- Signage/Visibility



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
