The Sector Partnership Group is now on a good path, and the reins of leadership has now been transferred to the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, which has been the lead on the other sector partnerships in the State.

## UPDATE ON RE-AUTHORIZATION OF THE WORKFORCE INNOVATION AND OPPORTUNITY ACT

(as of January 28. 2025)

#### **Background:**

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), enacted in 2014, has been due for reauthorization since 2020. In late 2024, Congressional leaders introduced a bipartisan, bicameral agreement known as the **A Stronger Workforce for America Act (ASWFA) to reauthorize WIOA.** However, the 118th Congress concluded without passing this reauthorization, leaving the public workforce system at a crossroads.

#### **Current Status of the Reauthorization Process:**

- As of January 28, 2025, the reauthorization of WIOA remains pending. The 118th Congress adjourned without enacting the ASWFA, and the public workforce system continues to operate under the provisions of the original 2014 WIOA.
- The National Association of Workforce Boards (NAWB) has expressed the need for updated legislation to meet current workforce demands and is prepared to collaborate with the 119th Congress to advance the reauthorization process.

#### **Key Differences Between the Original WIOA and the Proposed ASWFA:**

#### 1. Funding Allocation for Training:

- o *Original WIOA (2014):* Provided flexibility in funding allocation for various workforce development activities, including training, supportive services, and administrative costs.
- OProposed ASWFA: Mandated that a minimum of 50% of all funds directed towards American Job Centers be allocated to upskilling and training programs through Individual Training Accounts (ITAs). This approach aimed to prioritize direct training services but raised concerns about reducing resources for supportive services like childcare, housing, and transportation, which are essential for underserved populations.

#### 2. Eligible Training Provider Lists (ETPL):

- o *Original WIOA*: Maintained a broad list of eligible training providers without stringent alignment requirements with employer demand.
- Proposed ASWFA: Streamlined the ETPL to focus on programs that directly align with current employer needs, emphasizing skills-based hiring and allowing job seekers to claim on-the-job experience in addition to traditional education and certificates.

#### 3. Demonstration Authority for Innovation:

- o *Original WIOA*: Did not explicitly provide mechanisms for local workforce boards to experiment with new approaches.
- o *Proposed ASWFA*: Introduced a demonstration authority granting select states and local workforce boards the flexibility to reimagine existing programs, fostering

innovation to address unique regional challenges and adapt to the evolving workforce landscape.

#### 4. Emphasis on Skills-Based Hiring:

- o Original WIOA: Focused on traditional credentialing and educational attainment.
- Proposed ASWFA: Promoted skills-based hiring by expanding the criteria for accepted credentials and recognizing competencies gained through prior experience, aiming to make the workforce system more adaptable and inclusive.

#### **Summary:**

While the proposed ASWFA introduced significant changes to funding allocations, training provider criteria, and hiring practices, these updates have yet to be enacted.

The reauthorization of WIOA remains a critical agenda item for the current Congress to ensure the workforce development system effectively addresses the evolving needs of both job seekers and employers.

# DISPOSITION OF WIOA PY 2022 FUNDS THROUGH WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

(as of January 28, 2025)

#### **BACKGROUND:**

States have three years to spend its WIOA allocations in a given year. The local areas use the WIOA funds within the two-year cycle, and whatever is not expended or spent, is turned over to the State. The State of Hawaii has one year to spend the WIOA funds, or until June 30<sup>th</sup> of the next year. Any left over monies will need to be returned to the federal government.

In PY 2022, the local areas returned \$3.9 million in unexpended funds, of which \$1.9 million has been encumbered. The Director of Labor and Industrial Relations has given the Workforce Development Council the remaining \$1.55 million to administer.

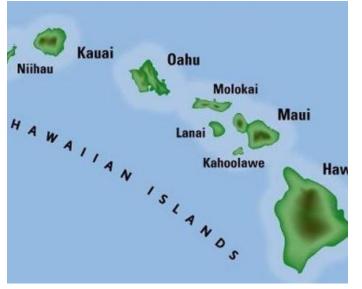

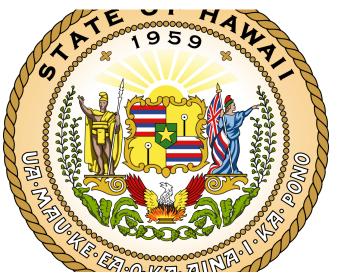
