#### I. Call to Order [00:01:32] by Tui Scanlan, Chair

Meeting called to order at 1:32 p.m. as public meeting under open meeting law. Members and guests introduced themselves.

# II. Presentation: Empowering Youth Through Conservation: The Kupu Foundation Approach [00:03:09] by Kaulana McCabe, VP of Programs, Kupu

# Overview of KUPU's Mission and Programs [00:04:47]

Kupu is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit established in 2007, starting with \$50,000 Hawaii Youth Conservation Corps grant on Kauai. Now serves 300-400 youth annually across Hawaii, Guam, Saipan, and American Samoa through 200+ site partners.

# Youth Development Through Conservation [00:05:18]

Four major programs outlined:

Hawaii Youth Conservation Corps Summer Program [00:06:58]: Ages 17+, Oahu and Maui only. 300 hours (8 weeks), \$18/hour plus \$1,565 education award. Applications increased after transitioning to hourly wage model based on youth surveys prioritizing paid employment.

**Kupu AmeriCorps Program [00:09:26]:** Ages 17-38, part-time or full-time up to one year. \$18-20/hour with PTO and healthcare. Created from CARES Act, continued through Green Jobs Youth Corps bill.

**Conservation Leadership Development Program [00:11:06]:** 6-11 months full-time, ages 17+, \$17/hour (\$18 Maui). Full service earns \$7,395 education award. Includes monthly start dates, professional development, service trips.

**Community Program [00:12:40]:** Ages 16-24, serves high school dropouts at Kupu Center in Keeaumoku Basin. Offers GED pathway, DOE alternative learning program, breakfast/lunch services.

#### Successes, Challenges, and Lessons Learned [00:20:13]

Record 1,600+ applications this year through social media influencer partnerships (Passion Santos, Magic Mike, Tumoa). Challenge: 70% local applicants, competing with immediate employers during lengthy placement processes.

#### **Opportunities for Future Collaboration [00:24:37]**

Funding: 50/50 philanthropic/government. Concerns about AmeriCorps federal cuts. Contingency plans include new green fee bill (\$100M to DLNR) and increased philanthropic support.

# Overview and Hawaii P-20 Vision [00:29:02] by Ryan Shimabukuro

Work-based learning intermediaries serve as relationship brokers between schools and employers. Three-year investment grew from two Oahu intermediaries to statewide coverage.

#### **Current Outcomes [00:36:28]**

2024 results: 200 work-based learning opportunities across 59 schools, 1,000+ professionals engaged, nearly 15,000 student participants. Partners include Kauai Economic Development Board, Hawaii Workforce Pipeline, Chamber of Commerce, Cultivate Hawaii, MEB, Vibrant Hawaii.

# Implementation [00:38:30] by Jen Sagapolutele-Tautuiaki

Hawaii Workforce Pipeline serves Windward and Honolulu districts using three-pillar model (home-school-community). Offers customized experiences from elementary career awareness through high school internships, including professionalism workshops, virtual career conversations, and on-site experiences.

# **Future Initiatives [00:55:52]**

Focus on sustainability, sector-specific implementation, and adapting to rural/remote communities with limited local businesses.
